The Acadia Hospital

Total Community Benefit: \$ 14,378,365

Community Impact: The first-ever Acadia Hospital Adventure Day Camps for youth ages 12-17 were held during the weeks of July 19-23 and 26-30. The first week Acadia hosted 10 youth ages 12-14, while the second week featured nine teens ages 15-17. The camps, which targeted youth who experienced non-acute behavioral and/or interpersonal challenges, were specially designed to expose youth to extensive team, trust, and relationship building activities throughout the week. All campers required some level of financial support, which came from a combination of community donations and scholarships provided by Acadia Hospital

Blue Hill Memorial Hospital

Total Community Benefit: \$ 2,017,075

Community Impact: Women and girls who turn to Blue Hill Memorial Hospital for their healthcare needs will benefit from a significant new endowment established by a generous family with ties to the communities of Blue Hill and Brooksville. Together, the family members contributed to a gift that is the largest received since Blue Hill Memorial Hospital's Renewal Campaign, which ended more than a decade ago. The family's gift was celebrated on August 20, 2010. Kathleen Ober, MD, an obstetrician and gynecologist with Blue Hill Women's Healthcare who also serves as the hospital's chief medical officer, praised the family's generosity and concern for women, particularly those that are vulnerable for socioeconomic reasons. The new endowment will help Blue Hill Memorial Hospital provide charity care for girls and women, and also purchase equipment and take care of other capital needs that directly help female patients of all ages.

Eastern Maine Homecare

Total Community Benefit: \$ 320,550

Community Impact: This Spring, Pathfinders: Support for Grieving Children provided support to 45 children and adults, including a four-year old boy and his grandmother. The little boy's young mother died of complications from surgery. The grandmother was suddenly faced with raising her young grandson and coping with both his grief as well as her own. The boy did not understand death and thought that his mother was being kept away from him. A pastor recommended Pathfinders to the family. At Pathfinders, the grandson learned what death means and his grandmother felt equipped to help him deal with his sense of loss. Today, he is in kindergarten and doing very well. Pathfinders was able to participate in their lives during a dark time and provide them with the tools and resources to cope appropriately with their loss and grief.

Staff there collect our repurposed food weekly, repackage it, and then distribute it through the pantry.

Inland Hospital

Total Community Benefit: \$ 8,541,209

Community Impact: "Wow, this trail is great and I plan to use it for exercise and to just get out and enjoy nature!" said an enthusiastic Susan Labbe-Gurney of Waterville as she enjoyed a guided tour of Inland's new Woods Trail built on the hospital campus on Kennedy Memorial Drive. Inland built the trail, which can be used for walking, biking, snowshoeing, and cross-country skiing as a way to make a lasting impact on the health and well-being of the community. One hundred people from the Waterville area and as far away as Portland attended a grand opening that was held on September 25. The trail features a one-mile loop that links to the City of Waterville's Pine Ridge Recreational Area and an extended network of trails. Inland collaborated with other local organizations on the trails project including the Central Maine Chapter of the New England Mountain Bike Association, Waterville's Parks and Recreation Department, and Kennebec Messalonskee Trails. A grant from the Department of Conservation, Recreational Trails Program is helping pay for the new trail.
